The Strathgartney Summer Horse Trial was very successful with 39 entries. Thanks to organizer Donna Allen, it went very smoothly even with it being the first HT with the new format. The review from the technical delegate, Michael Gallagher, was positive and he stated that it was the first time that he didn't have any comments on how to improve it. There were 32 entries at the Strathgartney Fall Horse Trial which is still plenty. There were new riders from New Brunswick that were pleased with the course and are excited about coming back next year. Thanks Laura Dear for your first effort at organizing a horse trial. Both HT's had positive reviews from the technical delegates with minor issues to improve upon. Hats off to Jennifer Brown and Linda MacPhail ( and Matthew MacPhail) for the great secretary job they did this year!

## Strathgartney Hosts Maritime Levy Dollars Working Clinic

Strathgartney Equestrian Park was the facility chosen to host the Maritime Levy Dollars Working Clinic August 9 and 10. This two day clinic provided high calibre instruction at very low cost for more experienced Maritime riders. The clinic was part of the Levy Dollars Working program organized by Canadian Eventing's Athlete Development Committee. Each competitor in a Horse Trial in Canada now pays a \$7 levy which is used to support Canadian Eventing's elite international calibre horses and riders. In return, these riders have agreed to donate their time, free of charge, as clinicians in Levy Dollars Working clinics throughout the country.

Clinician Garry Roque of Caledon Ontario came to PEI to instruct riders from all 3 Maritime provinces who have competed at or above the pretraining level. By all accounts the weekend was a great success. "I found him very relaxing, encouraging and supportive" commented New Brunswick rider Lori Leach. "He moved us along confidently. I would love to work with him again in the future".

Clinic organizer Susan Dohoo was also very pleased with the weekend. "We would all like to

thank Garry" she said, "for donating his time free of charge as part of this excellent program which has been developed by Canadian Eventing. He worked very hard, and was very effective. The riders came away having accomplished more than they expected".

# **Strathgartney Update**

Phase two of the rejuvenation of Strathgartney Equestrian Park is nearing completion. The IHC Strathgartney Committee successfully raised over \$17,000 from the Sir James Dunn Foundation of New Brunswick, the PEI Departments of Community and Cultural Affairs, Technology and Development, as well as Agriculture and Forestry to support this phase of the work.

As a result of these efforts there is a new storage shed in place, a new set of stadium jumps has been constructed, a new dressage ring is ready for staining next spring, the visitor's parking area has been completed, bleachers have been ordered and there may be enough money for a sound system as well. The effort involved has been substantial. Many thanks to Linda MacPhail, Jennifer Brown, Jackie Waddell, Angie MacDonald, Kevin Laughlin, Ian Dohoo and Susan Dohoo for making these improvements a reality. The Equestrian Park has now been completely transformed into a safe and well designed facility for schooling, pleasure riding and competing.

In the true spirit of "If you build it they will come", there were 16 bookings for Strathgartney in 2003, including the Tantramar Pony Club of Nova Scotia and a Regional Eventing Clinic attended by riders from all three Maritime provinces. Compare this to one booking for the 1999 season.

Strathgartney also weathered tropical storm Juan thanks to the storm preparations done by Jackie and Kevin. Although there are a couple of big poplars down on the cross country course, the new buildings all survived unscathed.

## **Membership and Insurance**

Island Horse Council changed its constitution this year so as to accommodate a more comprehensive and appropriate insurance policy for equine activities. What does this mean to us? Before, you would get your insurance through IHC when you paid your HTPEI dues; now you join IHC separately from HTPEI and get your horse liability insurance at that time.
